# FLOWERS PRING FINA

Tennyson may have said "In the spring a young man's fancy lightly turns to thoughts of love," but for the rest of us, spring brings thoughts of something else: a fresh and clean start! With this tutorial, we'd like to help you freshen up by offering your dining room a new wardrobe, complete with floral designs and monograms, that you can customize for your home and family. This project is also great gift for a house warming or a spring wedding.

### Materials:

Corel DRAWings

CorelDRAW Clipart CD (CD 2)

Enough cloth to make the Tablecloth and Napkins. (See below for measurements)

Thread to complete the project

Stabilizer to complete the project

### In Advance:

Install the Flemish\_.ttf (Flemish Script) font from CD 3 to your fonts folder. See the Windows Help files under "To add a new font to your computer" for instructions.

# Measuring the Table Cloth & Napkins:

- Measure the length and width of your table. Be sure to differentiate between the two measurements with "L" and "W."
- Determine the desired "drop" or overhang of the tablecloth. This is the length of the tablecloth that hangs over the table edge.
  - Casual or everyday tablecloths: the drop is 10-12" or about above the chair seat.
  - Formal dining tablecloths: the drop is 16-24".
  - Floor-length tablecloths: the tablecloth reaches to within 1/2" of the floor (about 28-29").
- 3. Double the drop and add to both the length and width.
- Napkins can be from 12" to 16" square.
- Finish the edges and corners of all pieces.

# Napkins:

For the napkins, we are going to create a customized monogram using both a floral design and an initial. You may choose to use the first initial of each member of the family, or the first letter of your family surname. Of course, you can add multiple initials if you choose, but for this project, we will only be using one.

- Open Corel DRAWings. From the New Design dialog, select Create New. Click Next.
- From the Artwork Source dialog, select New CorelDRAW Graphic. Click Next.
- From the Fabric dialog, select the fabric you will be using.We are using a light-weight cotton for that 'spring fresh' feel.

- 4. Select the color you will be using from the Color selection palette. If you don't see your color, simply double click on any color on the palette to open the Color dialog. You can then select your color from there.
- 5. Click OK.

We are going to be using some clipart to start our design. The beauty of Corel DRAWings is that it allows us to edit the clipart to get just the right look.

- 6. Click the Import button on the toolbar.
- From the CorelDRAW Clipart CD (CD 2), browse to Clipart/Flowers.
- 8. We will be using flowers from series G0474268.cdr to G0474286.cdr (9 different flowers in all). Select one that appeals to you. For this project we suggest selecting a different flower for each napkir
- We will continue this project using G0474269.cdr. Select it and click Import. Hit ENTER to center the image.
- Resize the image to make it larger using the Property bar.
  Ensure that the image is selected by clicking on it.
- 11. Ensure that the Non-proportional Scaling/Sizing Ratio button is locked (it looks like a padlock and for this step it should be LOCKED). This will force the height and width of the object to remain in the same proportion, regardless of how it is resized.
- 12. For these exercises, we are going to resize all of our flowers to 3.5" in height. Type 3.5 in the height box and hit ENTER to set it
- From the Zoom drop down box, select To Fit, so that you can view the entire diagram.
- 14. There is too much detail for our purposes, so we are going to simplify this image. Click the Ungroup button in the Property bar to separate the objects.
- Click in a blank area to deselect the image, then select only the background pattern. Hit the Delete key to remove it.
- 16. This image has some interesting shading in it, which looks great for print, but for this project we will need to eliminate the shading to create solid color areas.
- 17. Using the **Zoom tool** from the toolbox, focus in on one of the larger flowers. You will see two color shades making up the flower.



- 18. Hit the SPACEBAR to switch to the Pick tool.
- 19. Click on the inside color to select it.
- 20. Hold down the SHIFT key and click on the outside color (not the black border) to add it to the selection.
- 21. On the Property bar, select the Weld button to create a single object out of both colors. The entire flower will change to a single color.




- 22. With the flowers still selected, on the Property bar click the Break Apart 📋 button to make each flower a separate item.
- 23. Now repeat steps 19 22 for the leaves, stems, and any other flowers in the image

The clipart includes a large black area that serves as a border over which all of the other piece lie. This is intended for printing, but when used for embroidery, it will cause entire image to first be stitched in black, then all of the other colors stitched on top. We'll need to eliminate this black area and create borders of our own.

- 24. Select the black area using the Pick tool. Hit DELETE to remove it.
- 25. Zoom to Fit. Use CTRL + A to select all of the pieces of the image.
- 26. Click the Outline tool 4 to open the Outline Flyout. Select a 1 point outline for the entire image.
- 27. Click the Stitch tab to view your progress.
- 28. Depending on the flower you selected, you may have some extra pieces that were not visible on the white page background. You will be able to see them in the stitch view. To remove them, click on the DRAW tab to return to the graphic, select the piece you want to remove and delete it.
- 29. If necessary, click on the DRAW tab.
- 30. Now it's time to add the Monogram. For this exercise, we are going to use Flemish Script for its sweeping curves and flowing lines. You can, of course, vary the font you use for each of the monograms.
- 31. Select the Text tool and click in a blank area on the page. Type the initial you wish to use for this Napkin. Click the Pick tool to select the letter.

- 32. With the letter selected, use the Font drop down list to select the Flemish Script font. Change the Size to 200.
- 33. Reposition the letter so that it intertwines with the flower design.
- 34. Click on the Stitch Tab to view your progress.




- 35. Use CTRL + A to select all of the objects.
- to change all of 36. Click the Step stitch button the objects.
- 37. Click on the letter and select Satin stitch. on each of the stem parts and select satin stitch.
- 38. When you are satisfied with your design, select File/Save As from the menu bar and change the Save as Type to match your machine.

# The Table Cloth:

The table cloth design is created by using the flowers (without initials) as described above. The final layout is up to you. We have stitched it in the center of the tablecloth.

For the following example we used six different flowers, all resized to 6 inches in height and sewn, one by one, in a circular pattern. You can choose to use a single flower motif, or include a large monogram in the center. Design anything you like!

To accommodate most machines, we recommend stitching each flower and then resetting the hoop to the following position after each flower. Above all, we hope you have a great time doing this project!
